

It grows wild in most of the <u>tropics</u> and is considered a <u>weed</u> in many places; its native range is not well known but probably <u>outh Asia</u>

In Konkani we call it Taikulo. In Marati it is Takala.

Its leaves, seeds, and root are used in <u>folk medicine</u>, primarily in <u>Asia</u>. It is believed to possess a <u>laxative</u> effect, as well as to be beneficial for the eyes. As a folk remedy, the seeds are often roasted, then boiled in water to produce a tea. The plant's seeds are a commercial source of <u>cassia gum</u>

, a food additive usually used as a thickener and named for the Chinese Senna's former placement in the genus

Cassia
